Read the text carefully and do the following activities

Gaza, one of the world's longest inhabited areas, has been home to a diverse array of people since at least the 15th century BC. Empires, including the ancient Egyptians, Assyrians, and Romans, have come and gone, at times dominating the land of the Canaanites, the ancestors of the Palestinians, leaving relics of their own cultural heritage behind. Greeks, Jews, Persians, and Nabateans have also lived along this coast over the centuries.

However, since the start of the Israeli airstrikes on October 7th, nearly 200 sites of historical importance have been destroyed or damaged in the Palestinian enclave, including libraries, religious sites, and others. Gaza's Tourism and Antiquities Ministry estimated that about 104 mosques have been damaged or destroyed. This includes the Othman bin Qashqar Mosque, Sayed al-Hashim Mosque, which was built in the 12th century, and The Great Omari Mosque, considered to be the oldest in Gaza City. Churches like The Byzantine Church of Jabalia, built in 444, were also damaged.

Moreover, museums and libraries were also affected, including the Al-Qarara private museum in Khan Younis, which dates back to the Canaanite era, and The Rafah Museum, considered Gaza's main museum of Palestinian heritage. Additionally, intangible heritage including customs, culture, and artifacts, has also been damaged.

The destruction has led to international condemnation, with accusations of war crimes against Israel. Isber Sabrine, president of an international organization that documents cultural heritage, said that Israel is trying to erase the connection of the Gazans with their land.

Part one: Reading

(14 pts)

Read the text carefully and do the following activities

The Algerian public education system is free and open to all children ages 6 to 16, regardless of ethnicity and nationality. Despite universal access to education, schools in the southern regions of Algeria face attendance problems, with children as young as age 13 or 14 dropping out of school.

Non-Algerian children face other barriers to education such as required documentation of grade level or testing to determine their level. In addition, migrants who do not speak Arabic, the language of instruction, face challenges in the Algerian education system. These informal barriers to education, specifically for migrant children, result in absence from school and contribute to increased vulnerability to child labour.

School-aged children in Algeria generally attend school regularly, so jobs for children are often part time and informal in nature, with some children working in small-scale family-run businesses such as restaurants or small stores.

Algeria made minimal advancement in efforts to eliminate the worst forms of child labour. In April 2023, the government passed a law that largely removes the requirement of proving force, fraud, or coercion for the prosecution of child trafficking crimes, which will enter into force after publication in the national gazette. Additionally, The Labour Code prohibits anyone under age 19 from working at night and anyone under age 18 from performing work that is harmful to their health, safety, or morals.

The government has established laws and regulations related to child labour. However, gaps exist in legal framework to adequately protect children from the worst forms of child labour. The types of work that are hazardous for children to perform are not defined by national law. Moreover, the labour inspectorate is authorized to inspect all workplaces but fails to investigate some, such as houses or informal construction sites, resulting in instances of child labour going undetected.
